Building Community at the Library


The Nealley Library has consistently received highly favorable ratings by students completing the *Santa Ana College Student Satisfaction Survey* published by the District Research Department. According to the most recent 2013 survey, 84% of the respondents reported using the library. For two consecutive years (2012 and 2013), 89% of the respondents gave the library an "excellent" or "good" rating. We are thrilled that students view the library in such a positive light. In addition to our services, resources, and spaces that support student learning and research, we are now using an area near the entrance for displays and interactive activities.

One of the activities involves the use of a whiteboard easel. Once or twice a week we write questions for students to answer. The questions are on a variety of topics. Examples are "Who inspires you?" and "If you could travel anywhere, where would you go?" As the photo here illustrates, the easel has been very popular! After hearing about the SAC question easel, librarians at Pasadena City College, Cal State Fullerton, and Pennsylvania State University have replicated the same activity in their libraries.


We are also continuing to enhance our displays by offering book drawings. For Women's History Month, over 200 students entered the book drawing. We are currently offering a prize drawing of poetry books in April for National Poetry Month. In addition, for the month of April we created "Poem in Your Pocket" handouts of 10 different poems by Anne Sexton, Jack Kerouac, poet and former SAC professor Lee Mallory, and other poets. Students have taken home nearly 500 of the poem handouts. More displays and activities for the SAC community are on the horizon! ♦

The busy whiteboard easel gets a new question every few days. Question above: "What was the best book you read over the summer?"





MeCha Mural

By the time you read this, its 40th birthday will have passed. The years have taken a bit of a toll, but its essence has not faded a second.

It has been in several books, starred in a video, and has been the subject of countless articles.

The MeCha mural is located inside the Nealley Library. It is a beautiful piece of art that has its origins with Dr. Shifra Goldman, who taught Chicano Art History, Sergio O'Cadiz, a local artist, and Santa Ana College MeCha students. Since May of 1974, the mural has been made available for everyone to appreciate anytime the library is open.

Carrying the true spirit of the Mexican mural masters, this artwork is made available for the masses. This piece of art is not to be enclosed in a building for only the elite, who have the time and can afford a visit to a museum.

Through the use of icons and symbols, the mural tells the history of Mexico from its indigenous roots to the painting of the mural by students.
