Professor, Nursing

Gina has been a full-time faculty member in SAC's Department of Nursing for the past 29 years. Presently, she is teaching the hospital-based portion of obstetrics, pediatrics, and community-based nursing in the second semester of the program. In this particular course, Gina spends immeasurable hours directing hands-on nursing care to patients by students in an acute care hospital setting. This content is specifically geared to Gina's professional practice and benefits from her rich experiences in maternal-child nursing and across the nursing curriculum.

Working both as a registered nurse and college educator, Gina is completely devoted to providing holistic and safe care with utmost regard to the dignity and value of each life served. In the clinical setting with students, Gina is known for creating an atmosphere that invites life-long learning while challenging students to develop clinical reasoning and judgment. Gina has spent countless hours teaching, evaluating, and mentoring students to become safe and effective practitioners while developing passion for the profession.

For over two decades, Gina was the lead lecture instructor for the obstetrical content of the Nursing program before becoming the Project Director for the Center for Nursing Expansion and Innovation Grant and the Assistant Director of Nursing for the Extended Campus Program. As Project Director, Gina oversaw the activities associated with a multi-million dollar grant that funded the development and implementation of the nursing program expansion. She was essential in the creation of a case management approach to enhancing student success. Through the efforts of this grant, 160 additional nursing students entered the program and the retention rate was a phenomenal 89%. In addition to the expansion arm of the grant, Gina also provided oversight to the innovation piece which included major

infrastructure changes to the Nursing Skills Lab and the creation of a simulation lab and computer lab.

Gina has represented the Nursing and Health Sciences Department on the Division Curriculum Committee, the Curriculum and Instruction Council, and the Teaching/Learning Committee. Currently she is the Curriculum Committee Representative for the Science, Mathematics, and Health Sciences Division and the co-chair of Standard I for the SAC Accreditation Report. She also served for many years on the Faculty Development Committee involved with curriculum development funds for special projects. In spring 2011, Gina participated on a faculty panel for the Book of the Year, The Last Lecture by Randy Pausch. She spoke to attendees about finding her passion in the nursing profession, and how she works every day to find greater personal and professional fulfillment.

In addition to her teaching assignment, Gina has served as the Assistant Director of the Extended Campus Nursing Program for the past seven years. This program is a unique partnership for nursing education shared with St. Joseph Hospital in Orange which provides an effective alternative educational setting and schedule for students to complete the requirements for the Associate Degree in Nursing. Each Thursday evening during the academic year, Gina is present at St. Joseph Hospital to assure that the program objectives are being implemented with the highest of standards.

Gina is very close to her immediate and extended family. She enjoys traveling and has many fond memories of Thanksgivings with her husband and two sons in Yosemite.

It is perhaps Gina's own words that best showcase her dedication and gentle élan, "I have been very fortunate over the past 29 years to experience both faculty and administrative roles at SAC and the many activities that are inherent to both. I have put 100% of my talents and treasures into the Santa Ana College community and the community at large to develop my growth potential with the ultimate outcome benefiting the needs of students. I am looking forward to many more productive years at Santa Ana College during which time I will continue to be a role model for the college and the profession of nursing."

John has been teaching English for the past nine years. He began his career at SER Jobs for Progress, teaching Adult Basic Education (ABE) and GED preparation. John then moved on to the Santa Ana College School of Continuing Education where he teaches ESL and high school-level reading and writing. He also teaches ESL and composition at Cerritos College.

When the Basic Skills Initiative came to the School of Continuing Education, John was struck by the similarities between basic skills "best practices" and ESL teaching methods. Feeling he could make a contribution, he joined the program, first as a researcher, then as a curriculum writer. John worked on the committee that designed the courses for the basic skills reading lab and wrote three high school-level composition courses designed to move students from paragraph to college writing: Composition 1, 2 and 3. This year, John began work as the ESL Reading/Writing Facilitator for the School of Continuing Education. Aside from providing assistance to ESL writing teachers, John has written the twenty SLO Rubrics that will be used to measure how well students in the ESL program are meeting objectives. In conjunction with the ESL department, he has also designed the training program that will help instructors complete the rubrics successfully. John is also active in professional development, having facilitated a number of writing and basic skills workshops. He also presented at the CATESOL Regional Los Angeles Conference in 2008 with Susan Gaer and Danna Weber.

In the classroom, John feels strongly that his most important task is to get students to trust him. Students who trust their instructor become invested in their learning and allow themselves to move beyond memorization. John's patience, warmth, and genuine interest in students' lives goes a long way to establishing this, but he also believes that one of the best ways to get students to trust him is by engaging students visually, kinesthetically, interpersonally. Students will understand and be ready to apply concepts better, but just as importantly, they will know they understand these concepts and see value in the classroom environment.

John lives in Santa Ana with "Ralphie," a cat he rescued from the Centennial Education Center campus. He has been writing the same novel for over ten years.

Mike was born and raised in Santa Ana and attended Santa Ana College after high school taking general education and fire technology courses. Mike currently works for the Santa Ana Police Department as a Forensic Specialist/Crime Scene Investigator and is completing his 23rd year there. Mike has worked many violent crime scenes including but not limited to murders, fatal traffic collisions, sexual assaults, officer involved shootings, robberies, burglaries, domestic violence, and suicides. During his time with the SAPD, he has worked in several ancillary positions as well including the Traffic Division, 911 Communications Section, Homeland Security Section, SWAT/Crisis Negotiation Team, and the Training Division as a First Aid/CPR/ AED trainer. Mike also teaches seminars in crime scene investigation and the hiring process and can be found guest speaking at various functions and events. Mike has received many awards including a police service medal of valor for attempting to extricate a teenage boy from a burning vehicle.

Mike enjoys teaching and is excited knowing he is offering his students a reality based approach to law enforcement. He not only educates the students with the theories behind the curriculum but prepares the student with the realities of what they can expect when they reach their occupational goals. Mike has partnered with Police and Fire Publishing authoring a workbook to allow the students to use a hands-on approach to supplement their learning.

<u>CSI: Beyond the Yellow Tape</u>, adopted at numerous colleges across the nation, offers students an opportunity to explore beyond the theories of a normal textbook and explains the reasoning as to why and how the actions of a crime scene investigator are performed. The book has several components that allow students to: 1) prepare for a career in law enforcement, 2) apply what they learn from the lectures in class, and 3) use it as a reference

manual in the future when they do get hired as a law enforcement officer. Mike wrote this textbook in an easy to read format while adding Quick Reference (QR) codes to each chapter so students can scan the QR code and watch the videos on their smart phone to reinforce the subject matter and what was lectured in class. Chapter review questions and real scenarios were added for the students so they can understand the learning outcomes and stimulate critical thinking. Finally, a "scent" page with various types of odors encountered at a crime scene has been incorporated into the book to prepare students for the realities of the job.

Mike believes in taking each student's education very seriously and understands the demands that college brings but also feels it is important to ready the students for the realities of life after college. By using his textbook, Mike prepares his "law enforcement professionals in training" (his students) to be close to a real crime scene without exposing them to the dangers of the job and offers them advice on the best way to pursue their career goals.

This American Bar Association Approved program is intended to prepare students to meet the California Business and Profession code regulations to be a Paralegal in the State of California. A paralegal works under the direct supervision of a licensed member of the California State Bar in providing legal services to the public.

Students are actively involved in the expanded internship and work experience program. Students are involved and are student members of the Orange County Paralegal Association, and one student is serving as the Student Co-Chair. Students have served over 500 hours of volunteer service through the Legal Aid society. The paralegal students are one of the top certificate and degree achievers for Santa Ana College.

Faculty responsible for the program presently work with the Legal Aid Society of Orange County to provide internship students to assist in the providing of legal services to indigent and low income residence of Orange County. This year Santa Ana College students under the supervision of Professor Robinson will have provided 500 hours of volunteer service to the community. In addition our supervised work experience/internship students

have provided 1100 hours of service to the legal community.

Professors Manzano and Robinson complete 24 hours of certified continuing legal education in compliance with the California State Bar regulations. Both are active members of the California State Bar and the American Association for Paralegal Education, and they regularly attend the regional conferences. Professor Robinson is a member of the Orange County Bar association and both are involved with the Orange County Paralegal Association. The paralegal faculty represent the college at the Los Angeles/Orange County Workforce Development Leaders consortium. Both Professors attend the work force development program meetings. Professor Manzano is on the Distance Education Advisory committee. Both professors are involved in the upcoming accreditation process for Santa Ana College: Professor Manzano is the faculty co-chair for the Section 4 committee, and Professor Robinson is serving on the Standard 2A committee. Professor Robinson also serves on SACTAC. Both professors are certified to teach distance education courses as well as many of the department's adjunct faculty.

The paralegal faculty represent the college at the Los Angeles/Orange County Workforce Development leaders. Professor Manzano and Robinson help sponsor and facilitate the Orange County Paralegal Association student section conference at Santa Ana College twice a year.

There is an advisory committee comprised of members of the public and of the legal profession. The advisory committee meets a minimum of two times per year. Student alumni are members of the advisory committee. All of our adjunct professors work in the local community as either attorneys or paralegals.

The program is currently revising the brochure to reflect major changes in the program curriculum. The web page now available on the SAC.edu web site has been completely revised in the Spring 2013 semester, and is still under development. The planned web site will have links to job opportunities and networking opportunities for students. The program also has a Facebook and LinkedIn page to support the program; Professor Robinson also has a twitter feed focused on legal issues.

Rick Manzano has taught at Santa Ana College for 25 years. His dedication to and longevity with the Paralegal program is respected by his peers. He and his wife live in Orange, in her childhood home. When he isn't working he can be found in his kitchen preparing items carefully nurtured and grown in his backyard for the evening meal.

Kristen Robinson has worked at Santa Ana College for two years. She is a mother to two children, a kindergartener and a three year old.
