Nominations submitted by SAC faculty and students are reviewed according to such criteria as awards and honors received, writing and publication, civic involvement, leadership experiences and other activities that demonstrate a commitment to excellence in teaching



Matthew Beyersdorf Professor, English

Matthew Beyersdorf began his career at SAC as an adjunct faculty member in the English Department in 2004 and was hired full-time in 2006. Since 2006 Matthew has served as Department Chair for English, the Academic Senator for the Humanities Division and has been a member of many committees including Program review, Guided Pathways, Veterans Advisory and Nursing Admissions Committee to name just a few. And while his campus involvement is truly impressive, it is his work in the classroom and behind the scenes that he is most proud of. Creating assignments that are fun and engaging but still requiring writing skills is a top priority. Using books such as "The Cask of Amantillado" by Edgar Allan Poe requires Matt's training as an attorney to teach students argumentation and evidence gathering. And while the play "A Doll's House" written by Henrik Ibsen in 1879 may appear to be unrelatable to SAC students, issues such as relationships, the role of women and their lack of opportunities are issues we are still dealing with today. When not collaborating with departments across the campus, Matthew can often be seen tidying up the campus, picking up trash, lowering umbrellas in the wind and trying to remove graffiti with his Mr. Clean Magic Eraser. Most importantly, Matt is here for students and has more than once helped a hungry student by purchasing a meal for them. What makes Matthew the amazing teacher he is, is his humor and his willingness to open up to students as he shares his family story of immigration, struggle, hard work and success. His love for SAC, his hard work and his dedication, makes Matthew Beyersdorf truly worthy of the Distinguished Faculty recognition.

Distinguished Faculty Award Finalist



Becky EttingerProfessor, Nursing

Becky Ettinger has been a faculty in Nursing since Fall of 2006. She is presently teaching obstetrics and pediatrics in the second semester of the nursing program. As a full time, nursing faculty member, Becky spends one clinical day (12 hours) per week in the hospital setting. As a clinical instructor, she models to her students how to provide compassionate care to each patient and family encountered. Her goal is to inspire her students by example and empowerment as they render excellent nursing care. Becky served as the nursing department's Curriculum Committee Chairman for six years as they developed their new approach to nursing education, Concept Based Curriculum. The curriculum change required monthly meetings and sub committees to meet regularly to accomplish this task. The committee, headed by Becky, unanimously voted to complete a major curriculum change in 2013. That process concluded in 2015, was approved in 2016, and was implemented in Spring 2017. In addition to being a leader at Santa Ana College, Becky is very involved in the community. Her expertise in evidencebased sex education were requested countless times, but two presentations stand out: the presentation to the Orange County Department of Education Board Meeting in the spring of 2018 and the presentation to the Orange School Board in June of 2018. Besides being an excellent instructor, a leader in her department amongst her colleagues and a leader in the community, Becky is also an author. In 2007, she wrote a book about the STD Epidemic targeting adolescents, young adults, and parents, "What Every Parent Should Know About Teen Sex: the Secret STD Epidemic." Currently, Becky is writing a second book about the epidemic and the data she has collected at Santa Ana College. As Becky has stated, "the books are intended for a community audience written in laymen's terms, and the overarching theme is regarding consequences and risks." Throughout her years of service Becky has shown to be a professional, knowledgeable, innovative and multi-talented Nursing instructor.

Distinguished Faculty Award Finalist



Kristen RobinsonAssociate Professor, Legal Studies

Kristen Robinson is a tenured faculty in the Legal Studies Department who has taught every course that is offered through the program. She is dedicated to Santa Ana College, to the students, and to her profession. One of her most significant achievements is in the development of the curriculum and program for the "Pathway to Law School." This transcripted certificate is a pre-law program that is aligned with the Chancellor's Office "Pathway to Law School" Program and Initiative to improve equity and diversity in the legal profession. Most recently, Kristen has started to work with the Open Education Initiative at SAC and has coordinated with her department to develop course materials for OER classes and to have Legal Studies courses listed on the California Virtual College. She serves as the Division Curriculum Rep and has served on a variety of SAC and District Committees as well. Kristen is always looking to improve her skills as a teacher, and she also mentors adjunct instructors and works with partners at various high schools. Kristen genuinely enjoys being at SAC and is always looking for innovative ways to motivate her students to learn-she wants her students to have fun while learning! One of the most unique classroom lectures she created was a presentation entitled, "Zombies and the Law: Legal Implications of the Un-Dead." Kristen researched real legal issues involving fictional zombies (e.g. probate law, quarantines, criminal law) and discussed with students various legal theories using a fun topic with multi-media elements. Kristen presented this lecture during Halloween, and it was a student favorite! As the interest has grown for her zombie lecture, she has presented it to classes throughout the division and even to the high school partners. This past fall semester, Kristen participated in a STEM week panel to discuss a zombie virus and legal issues surrounding quarantines. Kristen is passionate about what she does, and is always relevant and innovative in her teaching, program development and service to our college.

Dept of Child Development & Education Studies, Santa Ana College & Santiago Canyon College Anushi Seneviratne began college as a Business major, but a chance encounter at an elective Sociology class at Cal State Fullerton was what made her decide that a degree in Business wasn't what she really wanted. She graduated with her Master's degree in Human Services in 2001, and thereafter, began her second Master's degree in Early Childhood Education, specializing in leadership. In May 2020, she will begin her doctoral studies in Education with an emphasis in Social Justice at Cal Poly Pomona.

Eric Glicker, Ph.D.ESL Instructor
Santa Ana College, School of Continuing Education

Eric Glicker was born in San Francisco, California and moved to Orange County at the age of two years old. His parents bought a home in Fountain Valley, California, where Eric grew up. Eric's father was an Army Veteran who served in Korea and Japan. His mother was a Norwegian immigrant who married his father in San Francisco. Eric was raised in a bilingual household, attending a multicultural school in the Garden Grove Unified School District. His mentor was his junior high school Spanish teacher. Eric's teacher inspired him to become a teacher as well. After attending Servite High School in Anaheim, Eric majored in Spanish at San Diego State University, eventually earning his elementary and secondary teaching credentials in English, Spanish and Social Science. Eric spent his third year of year of university as an international student in Mexico City at the Universidad lberoamericana, completing thirty-six units toward his major and learning fluent Spanish.

After graduation, Eric returned to Orange County and taught high school ESL for the Huntington Beach Union High School District. While teaching high school, he earned his MA degree in English with a TESOL emphasis from Cal State Long Beach. Soon after, Eric also began teaching ESL for the Santa Ana College School of Continuing Education. He has now taught for the College for over 25 years. In addition, after the 9/11 attacks, Eric enlisted in the United States Navy and rose to the rank of Petty Officer, serving eight years. He was honorably discharged from the military in 2010. Finally, Eric used the GI Bill to earn his PhD in English Composition and TESOL from Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

A Boy Scout active in his community growing up, Eric has worked on construction projects with Habitat for Humanity in Santa Ana and Huntington Beach. Moreover, he has been an active volunteer with the Red Cross and Family Promise, a homeless shelter network that helps families through his church. At Centennial Education Center, Eric has worked as a Technology Mentor Teacher, earning his certification from the California Dept. of Education TIMAC Academy in 2016. He has also helped to lead the Professional Learning Community that works with adult educators in the consortium of local school districts in which Rancho Santiago CCD participates. Eric considers himself fortunate to be a college instructor and is grateful for the opportunity to serve his students and the local community.

Dori Dumon is a Santa Ana College graduate in Digital Publishing. Her SAC education provided a successful career pathway into multimedia web design with professional growth to become Vice President of Marketing for a software development company in Irvine. She is Adobe Certified, Microsoft Certified, and an FAA Part 107 Drone Pilot. Dori was an adjunct faculty for the SAC Business Apps & Technology Dept. from Fall 1990 to Summer 2017 teaching digital media applications at SAC and SCC. She taught computer technology, Microsoft Office apps, and Adobe apps for several years for SAC and SCC Community Services. She brings a realworld perspective to the

classroom to provide students a competitive advantage in business technology skills required in the workforce. Dori won the SAC Adjunct Faculty of the Year Award in 2017.

Dori was adjunct faculty and Department Chair in Spring 2017. In Fall 2017, she started as full-time faculty and continued her role as Department Chair. Dori is the SAC liaison for Hope Builders, a community partner, to assist disadvantaged young adults (ages 18-28) to gain employment readiness and business technology skills by completing the BA Office Management certificate program (17.5 units) in one semester. She has coordinated SAC services with each cohort of 20-25 students for fall and spring semesters for the last three years.

In 2018, Dori became the Lead Faculty for SAC Drones Projects. She has been working with other disciplines on campus to assist with curriculum development for drone technology courses and programs. She assisted with the first SAC Drones in Public Safety Advisory Meeting in October 2019 with Criminal Justice and Fire Technology. The first drone course to be offered at SAC is BA 158 Drones for Business in Spring 2020. In this introductory course, students explore careers using drones in a wide variety of industries. As an alumni of SAC, Dori enjoys the opportunity of teaching new technology to SAC students to innovate their skills for successful careers like SAC has done for her.

Associate Professor,

Adam Morgan was introduced to the California Community College system after graduating high school, attending and graduating from Irvine Valley College. He transferred to Cal State Fullerton and majored in Business Administration. After working in Forensic Accounting for 5 years, Adam transitioned to working in Supply Chain Management & Logistics for an additional 5 years. While working in Logistics, he received an opportunity to teach part-time at Long Beach City college, and he found his passion in the classroom.

In 2016, Adam began his career as an adjunct 'freeway-flyer', teaching at LBCC, Santa Monica College, and Santa Ana College. Dr. Elliott Jones, D.M.AProfessor, Music

Dr. Elliott Jones has been the choir director at Santa Ana College since 2000 Fall semester. Prior to teaching at SAC, he studied composition and choral conducting at Arizona State University, taught high school and middle school choir in Carlsbad, New Mexico, and earned his Doctorate of Musical Arts in Choral Conducting from the University of Miami. His setting of Robert Louis Stevenson's short poem "Requiem" is published by Walton Music under the title, "Under the Wide and Starry Sky." Recently Dr. Jones and the SAC Choirs have gained recognition for their series of "Anime Spectacular" concerts based on the music of well-known anime series and films. Elliott, along with his amazingly talented wife Holly and their three sons, enjoy performing in and directing local community musical theater productions. An avid video game nerd from way back, Dr. Jones maintains that few current games can deliver the wide-eyed wonder of Combat on an Atari 2600 in 1979. But he's happy to put that hypothesis to the test on a regular basis

Innovation Award

The Profiles in Excellence Innovation Award honors a faculty member demonstrating excellence in the development of innovative projects or activities, which support instruction, strengthen counseling and increases awareness of a program.



Michael R. Taylor, B.A.Associate Professor, Television and Video Communications

Michael Taylor was promoted to the position of KOCE-TV News Director for "Real Orange" on January 24, 2000 and served in that position until December 2014. As the News Director he oversaw the entire newsroom operation and was responsible for hiring and managing editorial and production staff. Michael was hired by KOCE in August 1997 as a producer to help launch "Real Orange" as Orange County's only nightly broadcast of news and public affairs.

Moving back to California after a two-year stay in Texas, he began a short-lived job as the Director of Communications for the American College of Trial Lawyers where he wrote and edited the association's newsletter and assisted with semi-annual meeting planning.

Michael moved to Texas in 1994 to take a job as the Executive Producer for KRBC-TV News (NBC). During his tenure in Texas he became the Weekend Anchor / Weekday Reporter.

Michael also has experience on and off the microphone in radio news and worked in print journalism for the South County News (Orange County Register) as the City Reporter for Laguna Niguel.

His journalism awards include a 2003 Los Angeles Area Emmy Award, the United Press International's "Best Investigative Story for 1995," awards from the Orange County Bar Association for Excellence in Legal Reporting and Golden Mike Awards in 2001 for Best Original News Commentary and 2002 for Best Documentary.

Professional Achievement Award

The final Profiles in Excellence Award is the Professional Achievement Award. This award is given in recognition of a faculty whose professional contributions have enriched his/her field of teaching, professional organizations or committees, and generated a significant and positive impact on student success that brings recognition to himself/herself, Santa Ana College or the School of Continuing Education.



Henry Kim, M.A.Professor, ESL
Santa Ana College, School of Continuing Education

Henry Kim served as the first full-time Student Services Technician/ Outreach Specialist in the noncredit ESL Program at North Orange County Community College District (NOCCCD) from 1998 to 2000. In his dual role, he increased new ESL student enrollment by 10%, applied for a grant with the noncredit Matriculation Coordinator and was awarded \$30,000 to purchase student furniture and showcases as well as supplies which he used to open up a new student center for noncredit ESL students at Cypress College. He was also the first staffer to request and to be approved to have a full-time counselor and several part-time counselors to serve specifically ESL students in the ESL Program. He was awarded the Member of the Year in Special Services, Chapter 167, in 1999 from CSEA. In 2000, he was hired as the first ESL Program Assistant and in that role, he developed new ESL Program orientations, supervised two ESL Labs and hired interns, produced marketing materials for the ESL Program, and secured funding to hold annual luncheons to recognize ESL faculty and their accomplishments.

Henry transitioned to Santa Ana College School of Continuing Education (SCE) to pursue his dream of teaching ESL students full-time at Centennial Education Center (CEC) and was hired as an Assistant Professor in the noncredit ESL Program in 2000. In addition to his teaching duties, he became the Student Development Program Coordinator from 2001-2009 and during those years, he created the Dragon Club and coordinated other

clubs for students, trained student leaders to direct large student conferences at SAC, hosted student leadership banquets, provided student help for information fairs, and organized, recruited and trained noncredit students to volunteer in leadership roles as the executive body of the Associated Student Government (ASG) at CEC. A memorable experience in 2007 was taking a trip with his then ASG student president to Sacramento along with SAC President Dr. Erlinda Martinez to receive an Exemplary Program Award for Innovative Noncredit Programs from the Chancellor's Office.

At CEC, as an SCE Curriculum Committee co-chair Henry led the effort to transition to CurricUNET (an online curriculum management platform) starting in 2011 and now to CurricUNET Meta to house SCE program courses and certificates which are used to award certificates to qualified students and provide instruction to thousands of noncredit students each year. Currently, he coordinates at CEC the English Language Lab faculty and staff who are providing Zoom sessions and software programs for temporary remote instruction to over 209 ESL students. In addition, he oversees the Resource Center at CEC that provides textbooks, instructional resources and equipment, as well as supplemental materials to faculty. He started in 2018 Fast-Track ESL courses for ESL students to complete their levels in half the time. As a member of the ESL Department, he is the current department chair, a professor of ESL, and is working on its four-year program review and articulation agreements with the SAC EMLS Department to open up further opportunities for ESL students to transition from noncredit to credit programs.
