To do this requires critical thinking at both verbal and non-verbal levels.

1. 2 lec, 2 lab. Introduction to basic music notation and orientation to instruments. Students choose an instrument and learn proper posture, hand position, and techniques for proper sound production.

2. 2 lec, 2 lab. Basic fingering techniques for notes and scales in the fundamental octave. Students learn warm-up techniques and the fingering patterns of notes within the easiest octave on their respective instruments. 
