COURSE TITLE: Weapon Mounted Light Transition Course

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of the course students will be able to:

1. Identify the components of the lighting system.
2. Demonstrate the ability to acquire and identify a target using the lighting system.
3. Demonstrate the safe handling of a firearm with a mounted lighting system.
