Bachelor of Science in Occupational Studies Selection Process - Fall 2018

The OS program will be using a multi-criteria selection process, using a point system. Points will be given for grades in selected classes, for cumulative GPA from the OTA program, and for completion of an in-class writing sample.

The point system as follows:

- Cumulative GPA from OTA Program
 - \circ 3.5 4.0 = 50 points
 - \circ 3.0 3.4 = 40 points
 - \circ 2.5 2.9 = 30 points
 - \circ 2.0 2.4 = 15 points
- Grade in highest level of math completed either Intermediate Algebra or Statistics
 - o Intermediate Algebra
 - A = 6 points
 - B = 3 points
 - C = 1 points
 - College Algebra/ Liberal Arts Math
 - A = 7 points
 - B = 4 points
 - C = 2 points
 - Statistics
 - A = 8 points
 - B = 6 points
 - C = 2 points

*Students with a "Pass" or who have "Tested Out" of either math component will receive an average score equivalent to a "B".

- Grade in anatomy and physiology
 - o If taken as a combined course
 - A = 6 points
 - B = 3 points
 - C = 1 point
 - o If taken separately (averaged between the two classes)
 - 3.5 4.0 = 8
 - 3.0 = 6 points
 - -2.0 2.5 = 2 points
- Score on in-class writing Max possible score = 50
 - \circ 50 = 40 points
 - \circ 40 = 30 points
 - o 35 = 20 points
 - \circ 30 = 10 points
 - \circ < 30 = 0 points

The writing sample will take place in the OTA classroom, T-210. Students will select one of two prompts to write a short essay. There will be 20 minutes to complete the writing sample. The writing will be evaluated for both content and correctness using this rubric:
