General Course Description Criminal Justice: A survey of the philosophy and history of criminal justice system (law enforcement, courts, corrections); processes of justice from detection of crime to parole; evaluation of modern criminal justice delivery systems.	General Course Description Criminal Justice: Criminal Justice: Students will investigate the qualifications and requirements for various lienforcement occupations and learn the nature history and philosophy of law enforcement. Other content area skills include constitution law, policing issues and trends, court systems and general aspects of law enforcement. Participants will study investigative technique and solve a crime scene using a forensics tear approach.
