The Library's Freedom to Read book prize drawing and display, created to correspond with the American Library Association's annual Banned Books Week, was popular again this fall. In October, 267 students entered to win 4 books: Ralph Ellison's *Invisible Man*, Dalton Trumbo's *Johnny Got His Gun*, James Baldwin's *Another Country*, and *This Bridge Called My Back: Writings by Radical Women of Color*, edited by Cherrie Moraga and Gloria Anzaldua. Information on books with a history of being challenged or banned in the U.S., created by librarians and students, was also available at the display table. ◊

When you see Susan at the library or around campus, please welcome her to the SAC community! ◊


## What Are You Reading?
