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Nealley Library Now Open on Saturdays!

Since mid-March the Nealley Library has been providing extended hours of service. We are pleased to announce that thanks to Student Equity funding the library has been able to open its doors on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. this spring semester. Students have been receptive to these extra hours of library service.

Group Study Rooms

The Nealley Library has 4 group study rooms for student use. These popular rooms are available on a first-come/first-served basis by making same-day reservations in person at the Reference Desk. Each room is equipped with a conference room style table and white board. Markers for the board may be checked out at the Reference Desk. Groups can reserve a room for 90 minutes maximum per day. A minimum of 2 students are required for reservations. In addition to the group study rooms, we have tables available throughout the building and individual study carrels located in a quieter section of the library.

Library & Information Science

- Library & Information Studies 100, Library Research Fundamentals, Tues., 1:00 p.m.-2:05 p.m. **or** Wed., 1:00 p.m.-2:05 p.m. **or** online from 10/19/15 - 12/11/15

Designed to provide students with survival skills in libraries. Print and non-print information sources such as reference books, magazines, databases and the Internet will be discussed. Students will participate in hands-on exercises in the Library.

Library Technology

- Library Technology 101, Introduction to Library Technology, Tues., 6:00 p.m.-9:05 p.m.
Introduction to libraries as a career field with particular emphasis on the role of the library technician in various types of library settings. This course provides an overview of library history, organization, staffing, services, collections, online information sources and terminology
- Library Technology 102, Information Sources for Paraprofessionals, Wed., 6:00 p.m.-9:05 p.m.
An introduction to information sources in both printed and electronic formats. Includes a basic theoretical and practical exploration of the nature and types of information in selected subject fields. Builds skills in information searching and in evaluation of information and information sources.
- Library Technology 053, Library Internship [for graduating students in the Library Technology Program], Wed., 4:00 p.m.-5:50 p.m.
Closely supervised field work experience in two selected library settings that will allow the student to apply learned knowledge and skills. Weekly review seminars and discussions are conducted in the classroom and on-line. To be taken in the last semester of an AA Degree or Certificate in Library Technology.
- Library Technology 122, Public Services, Thurs., 6:00 p.m.-9:05 p.m.
Exploration of library public services with special emphasis placed on a variety of issues as they relate to the circulation of library materials, the use of the Internet and full-text databases for reference and the preparation and delivery of library programs.
