## PLAN 2: 2025-2026

Effective Fall 2025, Cal-GETC is the new lower division general education pattern for California Community Colleges students transferring to the CSU or the UC. Continuing students may be eligible to continue to follow CSU-GE (Plan B) or IGETC (Plan C). Please consult a SAC counselor for additional information.

Completion of all the requirements in the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) will permit a student to transfer from Santa Ana College to a campus in either the CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY (CSU) or the UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA (UC) system without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses. For most students it is strongly recommended that they complete Cal-GETC prior to transfer.

1. **Complete all courses used for Cal-GETC certification with a minimum grade of C (C minus is not acceptable.)** A "pass" is acceptable providing it is equivalent to a grade of C or higher. The catalog must reflect this policy.
2. Request certification from the last California community college attended prior to transfer to CSU or UC. Petitions should be filed in the Graduation Office during the semester/session the student expects to graduate. Please consult the class schedule or a counselor for deadline information. Prior to requesting certification, have all official transcripts on file from every college attended.
3. Certification of coursework from other California Community Colleges completed for Cal-GETC will be honored provided that a course was on a college's approved Cal-GETC certification course list when it was completed. The coursework will be applied to the subject area in which it is listed by the institution where the work was completed. See [www.asssist.org](http://www.asssist.org).
4. Courses taken at other U.S. institutions (which do not maintain a Cal-GETC certification list) with accreditation from ICAS approved (formerly regional) accreditors will be placed in the subject areas for which Santa Ana College has equivalent courses. In some cases non-equivalent courses may also be considered. Please see a counselor for additional information and petition process. International coursework, from an institution without accreditation from an ICAS approved accreditor, cannot be applied to Cal-GETC.
5. IGETC approved courses taken prior to Fall 2025 may be applied in the same Cal-GETC area for certification. (\*\*For continuing students following IGETC, Cal-GETC approved courses taken Fall 2025 or later may be applied towards IGETC certification in the same IGETC area.)
6. Although a course may be listed in more than one area, it can only be applied to a single area for Cal-GETC certification (areas 5A/5B and 5C are exceptions).
7. No more than 14 semester units (21 quarter units) of Pass/No Pass, excluding credit by exam, may be used toward Cal-GETC certification.
8. Partial certification of Cal-GETC is not allowed.
9. Courses with fewer than 3 semester or 4 quarter units generally cannot be used toward Cal-GETC certification.
10. Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate exams can be applied to Cal-GETC. See the AP and IB charts for score requirements and GE area(s) awarded.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** The list of certifiable courses will be subject to change year by year, but students are assured that courses taken to meet Cal-GETC requirements will be honored **if they are approved for the academic year in which they are taken. Courses on this list are approved beginning Fall 2025 and are valid through Summer 2026.** Credit not granted for both honors and non-honors version of a course;

**2. LANGUAGE OTHER THAN ENGLISH, these requirements are not part of Cal-GETC and are not certified by Santa Ana College though they may be completed at SAC.**

##### 1. AMERICAN INSTITUTIONS REQUIREMENT

CSU has an American Institutions graduation requirement that is separate from Cal-GETC. Courses used to meet the requirement can usually also be used in Area 3 or 4. To meet the CSU requirement, students should take Political Science C1000 or C1000H (101/101H) AND one of the following courses: History 118, 120, 120H, 121, 121H, 123, 124, 124H, 127, 146.

UC requires the completion of a college course or courses with a grade of "C" or better OR a one-year course in high school in U.S. History or a half-year course in U.S. History and a half-year course in American Government with grades of "C" or better (UCLA requires an average grade of "B" or better). UCSB requires the completion of a college course. If you are using college coursework to satisfy this requirement, check the appropriate UC catalog to determine which course(s) to take.

##### 2. LANGUAGE OTHER THAN ENGLISH REQUIREMENT – UC ONLY

This UC graduation requirement is separate from Cal-GETC. Each UC campus has its own LOTE guidelines. Upon transfer to UC, a course that is approved to fulfill a Cal-GETC subject area may be used to satisfy the LOTE requirement. See: [UC Graduation Requirements](#)

##### \*\*CONTINUOUS ENROLLMENT FOR USE OF CSU-GE (PLAN B) AND IGETC (PLAN C)

Effective Fall 2025 Cal-GETC is the new transfer general education pattern and replaces CSU-GE Breadth (Plan B) and IGETC (Plan C). However, students who began at Santa Ana College (or another CCC or CSU campus) prior to Fall 2025 will be permitted to use the CSU-GE and IGETC patterns if they maintained **CSU continuous enrollment**. (Such students may also choose to complete Cal-GETC.) Please consult with a SAC counselor to determine CSU-GE Breadth and IGETC eligibility. See the 24-25 SAC Catalog for Plans B and C information.

**Courses must be included on the GE certification list at the time completed.**

1. Cal-GETC Certification Using Pre-Fall 2025 IGETC Courses:  
Students who completed IGETC-approved courses prior to Fall 2025, including courses that are no longer active in [assist.org](#), may apply those courses in the same Cal-GETC area(s) for certification.
2. IGETC Certification Using Cal-GETC Courses:  
Students seeking IGETC certification may use Cal-GETC-approved courses in the same area(s)—whether newly created or newly approved as of Fall 2025.

Note: These provisions are intended to allow for exceptional cases in which a student would be required to repeat a similar course or courses in the same GE area, expend more financial aid, exceed the transferable unit cap, or incur other undue burdens to transfer without this exception.

## ANNOUNCEMENT OF COURSES

Courses numbered 100 and above followed by the letter "H" are university parallel courses for transfer to colleges and universities and are offered as part of the Santa Ana College Honors Program. Students enrolling in these courses must meet the designated prerequisites.

All courses numbered 100 or above will transfer to all CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY campuses. These are indicated in the catalog by a "CSU" at the end of the course description.

Courses which are transferable to all UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA campuses are indicated in the catalog by a "UC" at the end of the course description. Some of the courses that are transferable to the University of California have credit limitations.

See [assist.org](#) to determine these limitations for each academic year. Courses must be UC transferable in the academic year they were completed in order to earn UC transferable credit.

Courses numbered less than 100 are not designed for transfer. Since these courses are not ordinarily offered in the universities and four-year colleges, they are not always applicable to the requirements for the bachelor of arts or bachelor of science degrees; however, courses numbered below 100 are applicable to the associate degree unless preceded by the letter "N".

Courses numbered less than 100 preceded by the letter "N" are not applicable to the associate degree and do not count toward graduation but do count toward course load.

### ACCOUNTING (ACCT)

#### ACCT 015

##### Education and Financial Pathways for Justice-Impacted Students

Unit(s): 1.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total.

This course introduces justice-impacted students to education and entrepreneurship pathways while emphasizing financial literacy, business planning, and the role of accounting in managing personal and business finances. Students will explore career options, develop startup skills, and create actionable post-release plans for education or self-employment success. This class is part of the SAC "Prison Education Initiative" designed for "Inside Scholars" at the Theo Lacy facility only.

### CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACADEMIES (CJA)

#### CJA 006B

##### Arrest and Control Training/ACT

Unit(s): 0.10-0.5 Class Hours: 1.0-3.0 Lecture, 3.0-21.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 099A Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certified basic law enforcement academy or equivalent as determined by discipline faculty. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee state regulatory or licensing agencies will also grant equivalency. Ability to legally possess a baton and firearm in the State of California. Obtaining a medical clearance and medical insurance prior to attending is strongly recommended. Ability to participate in strenuous activities such as kneeling, lying in prone position while handcuffed, handcuffing other persons, use of impact weapons, and physically controlling non-compliant or combative persons. Students will be exposed to tear gas and pepper spray.*

This course builds upon the student's existing skills and knowledge in the legal, safe, and proper application of arrest and control techniques in the law enforcement environment. Instruction includes safe and proper use of ground fighting techniques, use of chemical weapons, use of non-lethal weapons, and current case law.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

#### CJA 007A

##### Gangs, Cults and Hate Crimes

Unit(s): 0.5-2.0 Class Hours: 9.0-36.0 Lecture total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 099A and California POST certified peace officer.*

This course covers gangs, cults and hate crimes: ethnic gangs, organized crime, current gang trends, gangs and drugs, and drug cartels. Course information is POST and/or STC approved.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

#### CJA 008B

##### Corrections Supplemental Core Course

Unit(s): 5.5 Class Hours: 93.0 Lecture, 19.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Students sponsored by a California law enforcement agencies should meet agency standards.*

This course is designed for the corrections officer who has completed the Commission on Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) Basic Academy. It meets the California Standards and Training for Corrections (STC) regulations for entry-level training for personnel who work in adult custodial programs and facilities.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

#### CJA 035

##### Continued Professional Development Training for Civilians

Unit(s): 0.10-0.20 Class Hours: 1.0-4.0 Lecture, 3.0-4.0 Lab total.

This course updates the student's knowledge and skill set associated with providing support functions in a law enforcement agency. Instruction in current topics includes such topics as: ethics and professionalism, safety practices, drug symptomology, first aid & CPR, health and wellness, emergency response, interpersonal communication, sexual harassment, and promotion/leadership preparation. It may include additional subjects as determined by county council mandate or regional need.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

## **CJA 042B**

### **Crisis Intervention Training II**

Unit(s): 0.20 Class Hours: 3.0 Lecture, 5.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 042A As approved by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training; and CJA 099A as approved by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.*

Student will receive intermediate instruction in crisis intervention training for experienced peace officers. This course is offered in partnership with the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 042C**

### **Crisis Intervention Training III**

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 8.0 Lecture, 8.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 042A as approved by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training; and CJA 042B as approved by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training; and CJA 099A as approved by the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.*

Student will receive advanced instruction in crisis intervention training for experienced peace officers. This course is offered in partnership with the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 042D**

### **Crisis Intervention Training for Dispatchers**

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 10.0 Lecture, 6.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Commission on Peace Officers' Standards and Training (POST) Public Safety Dispatcher Certificate and/or completion of POST Dispatcher Basic Course or equivalent as determined by discipline faculty.*

Student will receive instruction in crisis intervention training techniques designed for dispatchers. This course is offered in partnership with the Orange County Sheriff's Department.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 050**

### **Introduction to Drone Laws**

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 9.0 Lecture total.

This course covers essential federal, state, and local laws and regulations for safe, legal drone operation. Designed for both new and experienced drone operators, it includes topics such as FAA regulations, FAA TRUST Recreational certification, Part 107 Remote Pilot certification, privacy issues, liability, drone insurance, and the enforcement of drone laws. Students will also explore legal cases and strategies. No drone flying is this course.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 059**

### **Law Enforcement Supervisory Course**

Unit(s): 4.0 Class Hours: 68.0 Lecture, 12.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 099A POST certified basic law enforcement academy or equivalent as determined by discipline faculty and consistent with POST and/or STC accreditation standards. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee state regulatory or licensing agencies will also grant equivalency.*

CA POST approved course for law enforcement personnel newly appointed to a first-level supervisory position. Topics focus on understanding the roles of law enforcement personnel and providing appropriate training and supervision in critical field situations.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 088**

### **Campus Law Enforcement Update**

Unit(s): 2.0 Class Hours: 34.0 Lecture, 6.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: CJA 099A Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certified basic law enforcement academy, or equivalent, as determined by the discipline faculty of the Criminal Justice Academy. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee that state regulatory or licensing agencies will also grant equivalency.*

This course is designed to expand the knowledge of peace officers working a campus environment. The course will include a history of campus law enforcement, legal authority, laws and liability, responsibility in learning environment, campus conduct, emergency response tactics, and the discipline process as it relates to students.

*(Pass/No Pass Only)*

## **CJA 099C**

### **Level 2 Modular Police Academy**

Unit(s): 6.5 Class Hours: 66.0 Lecture, 153.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Commission on Peace Officers' Standards and Training (POST) Certified Module 3 Police Academy Program or equivalent as determined by discipline faculty. NOTE: Approval of equivalent training is not a guarantee state regulatory or licensing agencies will also grant equivalency. Students sponsored by California law enforcement agencies must meet the POST hiring requirements. Self-sponsored recruits must successfully complete the required college screening procedures including interview, medical evaluation, and DOJ Livescan. Self-sponsored students must meet all prerequisites before entering the course, and will be responsible for providing their own required uniforms, equipment, and ammunition. All students must sign conduct, information sharing, student testing, and weapons handling agreements before the course. Violations of these agreements may result in immediate removal from the course.*

## FASHION DESIGN AND MERCHANDISING (FDM)

### FDM 052

#### Knit and Swim Suit Sewing

Unit(s): 3.0 Class Hours: 36.0 Lecture, 54.0 Lab total.

Construction techniques to sew lingerie, bathing suits, athletic attire, and knit t-shirts. Emphasis is placed on serger and cover-stitch machine operation, fitting issues, and garment specification measurement techniques as related to knit garments for domestic and offshore production.

### FDM 058

#### Decorative Apparel

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 4.5 Lecture, 13.5 Lab total.

Applied techniques of sewing embellishments on surface textures. Techniques include hand embroidery, beading, and appliqué.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

### FDM 080

#### Embroidery

Unit(s): 1.5 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture, 27.0 Lab total.

Applied techniques of embroidered decorative embellishments using embroidery software and machinery.

### FDM 081L

#### Fabric Printing Lab

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 27.0 Lab total.

*Corequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade or Concurrent enrollment in: FDM 080*

This course provides students enrolled in the Fabric Printing course with the opportunity for additional hours of work in the Fabric Printing Design Lab. Lab time is assigned on a space-available basis. Students completing 27 hours of lab work during the semester will receive .5 unit of credit.

### FAC 071A

#### Ventilation Review

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 8.0 Lecture, 8.0 Lab total.

Theory of positive pressure ventilation and panelized roofs; students will participate in walking, sounding, and cutting panelized roofs. A materials fee may be required. Not offered every semester.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

## FIRE OFFICER TRAINING

### FOT 050

#### Community Emergency Response Team

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 8.0 Lecture, 10.0 Lab total.

Educating the public to respond to terrorism response issues, theories, and methodologies for disaster mitigation.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

### FOT 060

#### Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator 1A: Driver/Operator

Unit(s): 1.0 Class Hours: 17.5 Lecture, 22.5 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Hold a valid Class C driver's license. License must be brought to first class session or student will be dropped from the course.*

This course provides information on fire apparatus preventive maintenance and driving/operating. Topics include routine tests, inspections, and servicing functions, operate, back, maneuver, and turn a fire apparatus in a variety of conditions; and operate all fixed systems and equipment on a fire apparatus. This course is based on the 2017 edition of NFPA 1002 Standard for Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator Professional Qualifications. This course fulfills the requirements for a California Class C Firefighter Endorsement. This course satisfies the partial requirements for State Fire Training Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator - Pumping Apparatus (2017) certification. A materials fee may be required. This course may not be offered every semester.

### FOT 079

#### S-404 Safety Officer

Unit(s): 1.5 Class Hours: 28.0 Lecture total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: FOT 008A Qualified as Division/Group Supervisor (DIVS).*

Designed to train company/chief officers in the advanced wildland fire safety factors that will aid them in safe and effective control of wildland fires. Not offered every semester. Materials fees may be required.

### FOT 079B

#### S-231 Engine Boss

Unit(s): 0.5 Class Hours: 12.0 Lecture, 4.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: FOT 078*

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: FAC 070 Completed SFT Firefighter 2 training*

This is a skill course designed to produce student proficiency in the performance of the duties associated with engine boss, single resource (ENGB). Topics include engine and crew capabilities and limitations, information sources, fire sizeup considerations, tactics, and wildland/urban interface.

(Pass/No Pass Only)

### FOT 080

#### Motion Picture / Television Safety Officer

Unit(s): 1.0 Class Hours: 24.0 Lecture total.

This course provides the student with a basic knowledge of fire safety in film production, both on the studio lot and in location filming. Areas covered include: filming and fire code permits, licensing, safety officer responsibilities, who's who on location, fire safety hazards associated with lighting, generators, electrical cabling, set construction, studio and warehouse filming, pyrotechnic special effects laws and regulations (handling, use, storage and transportation) and stunt safety. In addition, the training incorporates live pyrotechnic special effects and stunt demonstrations, special guest speakers, product orientation, and slides and videos from many different films.

## NONCREDIT COURSES

### HIGH SCHOOL SUBJECTS - NATURAL SCIENCES (HSSCI)

#### HSSCI 166

##### Introduction to Healthcare Sciences

Credit(s): 5.0 Class Hours: 72.0 Lecture total.

Basic medical terminology, explore basic anatomy and physiology, be introduced to microbiology, and gain an understanding of common diseases.

Open Entry/Open Exit

## VOCATIONAL - AUTOMOTIVE (VAUTO)

#### VAUTO 678

##### Electrical Fundamentals

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 72.0 Lecture total. 72.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VAUTO 668 or AUTO 102*

Introduction to the basic operating principles of electrical and electronic devices used in modern vehicles. Hands-on digital multimeter testing is highlighted. Safe and correct use of tools and equipment by students will be emphasized. The course will also include Ohm's law, circuit testing, electromagnetism, batteries, starters, and alternators. Students must furnish their own approved safety glasses. This course assists students in preparation for the A6 (Electrical/Electronics) ASE certification exam. Field trips may be required. May award ten (10) high school elective credits if student completes all the required assignments with a minimum passing grade of 70%. Upon completion of VAUTO 678, students may earn credit for AUTO 116 through the credit by exam process.

#### VAUTO 680

##### Introduction to Hybrid/Electric Vehicles

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 63.0 Lecture total. 81.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VAUTO 668 Introduction to Automotive Vehicle*

Systems or AUTO 102 Introduction to Automotive and VAUTO 678 Electrical Fundamentals or AUTO 116 Electrical Fundamentals This course will explore the function, operation, and design of hybrid/electric vehicles. The course will also focus on safe practices and procedures when working with high voltage systems. Students will build a purpose-built electric vehicle in the course and study current electric vehicle manufacturers. Students will work on hybrid transaxles also. High voltage systems will be examined, along with battery designs, AC and DC power motors, and electrical inverter/converters. Fuel cell vehicles are also included in the course content. Field trips may be required. Ten (10) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VAUTO 680, students may earn credit for AUTO 260 through the credit by exam process.

## VOCATIONAL - FINE AND PERFORMING ARTS (VFPA)

#### VFPA 009B

##### Dance Laboratory II

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 27.0 Lab total.

VFPA 009B requires audition or instructor approval prior to enrollment. Studio rehearsal time, emphasizing progressive development in the creation of dance concert productions, repertory performances and/or choreographic projects. Beginning-intermediate level assignments change every semester. Requires audition or instructor approval prior to enrollment. Two (2) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 009B, students may earn credit for DNCE 009B through the credit by exam process.

#### VFPA 107A

##### Dance Concert Performance - I

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 9.0 Lecture total. 45.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: By Audition Only*

Formal dance concert performance experience for dance students. Includes both rehearsal process and a minimum of three on-stage public performances. Audition required. Three (3) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 107A, students may earn credit for DNCE 107A through the credit by exam process.

#### VFPA 122A

##### Commercial Dance I

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 9.0 Lecture total. 27.0 Lab total.

Instruction for the beginning level dance student in commercial dance including technical steps, styles, audition techniques, and performance skills. The course focuses on level I skill set necessary for the preparation of dancing in commercial settings such as entertainment industries, cruise liners, music videos, mainstream entertainment productions, etc. Three (3) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 122A, students may earn credit for DNCE 122A through the credit by exam process.

#### VFPA 122B

##### Commercial Dance II

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 9.0 Lecture total. 27.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VFPA 122A Commercial Dance I or DNCE 122A Commercial Dance I*

Continued instruction for the beginning level dance student in commercial dance including the technical steps, styles, audition techniques, and performance skills. The course focuses on level II skill set necessary for preparation in dancing in commercial settings such as entertainment industries, cruise ships, music videos, mainstream entertainment productions, etc. Three (3) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 122B, students may earn credit for DNCE 122B through the credit by exam process.



**VFPA 133A****Musical Theatre Dance Techniques I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 18.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VFPA 122A or DNCE 122A or VFPA 201A or DNCE 201A or VFPA 219A or DNCE 219A or VFPA 250A or DNCE 250A*

This is a beginner level course that covers a variety of dance genres and styles used in musical theatre with an emphasis on basic skillsets for ensemble dancing roles and character development. Study also focuses on the styles and contributions of major musical theatre choreographers and performers from the Golden Age to current musical theatre trends, and the audition process as a dancer related to musical theatre. Two (2) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 133A, students may earn credit for DNCE 133A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 201A****Ballet I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

Beginning level I ballet technique and terminology, including basic barre work, center work, and combinations en diagonale. Includes basic alignment, use of turnout, coordination, and ballet terminology. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 201A, students may earn credit for DNCE 201A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 201B****Ballet II**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VFPA 201A Ballet I or DNCE 201A Ballet I*

Continuation of beginning ballet technique and terminology, including barre work, center work, and combinations en diagonale. Includes basic alignment, use of turnout, coordination, and ballet terminology for level II. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 201B, students may earn credit for DNCE 201B through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 204A****Dance Production I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

*Prerequisite: By audition only.*

Concert dance production experience culminating in public performances in Phillips Hall Theatre as part of the Spring Student/Faculty Dance Concert. Includes production basics, with an emphasis on performance techniques and working with faculty/student choreographers to create original dances. By audition only prior to enrollment. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 204A, students may earn credit for DNCE 204A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 206A****Modern Dance I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

A beginning level modern dance class emphasizing movement technique, dance vocabulary, and creative individual expression. Includes an introduction to choreographic principles and cultural context of modern dance. Students learn modern dance exercises and short dance combinations. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 206A, students may earn credit for DNCE 206A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 206B****Modern Dance II**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VFPA 206A Modern Dance I or DNCE 206A Modern Dance I*

Continued study in modern dance emphasizing movement technique, dance vocabulary, and creative individual expression. Includes an introduction to somatic approaches to dance training to support body connectivity. VFPA 206B is a continuation and refinement of learning longer dance combinations at the beginning-intermediate level. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 206B, students may earn credit for DNCE 206B through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 219A****Jazz Dance I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

Beginning level 1 jazz dance emphasizing movement technique, vocabulary, and creative expression. Includes an introduction to choreographic principles and cultural context of jazz dance. Historical and contemporary forms are studied. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%.

**VFPA 219B****Jazz Dance II**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

*Recommended Preparation: Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade in: VFPA 219A Jazz Dance I or DNCE 219A Jazz Dance I*

Continued study in beginning jazz dance emphasizing movement technique, vocabulary and creative expression. Includes an introduction to choreographic principles and cultural context of jazz dance. Historical and contemporary forms are studied. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 219B, students may earn credit for DNCE 219B through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 240A****Repertory I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

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**Prerequisite:** Audition

Students develop rehearsal and performance skills through learning a repertoire of dances. Includes preparation for public concerts and performances at different venues. Dances vary each semester. Requires audition prior to enrollment. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 240A, students may earn credit for DNCE 240A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 240B****Repertory II**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

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**Prerequisite:** Audition

Continued refinement of rehearsal and performance skills through learning a more difficult repertoire of dances. Includes preparation for public concerts and performances at different venues. Dances vary each semester. Requires audition prior to enrollment. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 240B, students may earn credit for DNCE 240B through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 250A****Hip-Hop Dance I**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

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A level I hip-hop dance course emphasizing movement technique, vocabulary, and creative expression. It includes choreographic principles, improvisation, and the cultural context of hip-hop dance. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 250A, students may earn credit for DNCE 250A through the credit by exam process.

**VFPA 250B****Hip-Hop Dance II**

Credit(s): 0.0 Class Hours: 18.0 Lecture total. 54.0 Lab total.

Continued study in hip-hop dance, level II, emphasizing movement technique, vocabulary, and creative expression. Includes improvisation, more difficult combinations, student compositions, and the cultural context of hip-hop. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%. Upon completion of VFPA 250B, students may earn credit for DNCE 250B through the credit by exam process.

**VOCATIONAL - HEALTH (VHLTH)****VHLTH 414****Introduction to Mental Health Disorders**

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Provide students with a basic foundation in major concepts of mental health for personal growth and workforce preparation. Mental health topics covered: Generalized Anxiety Disorder, major depressive disorder, Post-Traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), Adjustment Disorder, Attention Deficit/ Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Autism Spectrum Disorder, and substance use disorder. Five (5) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%.

**VHLTH 415****Introduction to Mental Health Services/Careers**

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**Corequisite:** Completion with a grade of "C" or better or a Passing grade or Concurrent enrollment in: VHLTH 414 Introduction to Mental Health Disorders

Provide students with services available for consumption and/or entry level career opportunities in the mental health industry. Mental health services and entry level career opportunities covered include, but not limited to: Inclusion Assistant (learning disabilities in school setting), In Home Supportive Services (IHSS), Respite Caregiver, Mental Health Advocate, Social Human Service Assistant, Private Caregiver, Behavior Interventionist, Adaptive Skills Therapist, and Parent Advocate. Four (4) high school elective credits may be awarded if a student passes the course with a minimum grade of 70%.
